# BENEFITS OF EVALUATION

\*Developmental assessments provide information to better support your child.

\*Family surveys help the program better meet your needs.

\*Parenting surveys and videotapes show caregiver's strengths so the program can build upon them.

\*Child and family data support continual program improvement.



# Tools that survey the Development of your Child and Family:

## Family well-being and parenting

Families complete a satisfaction survey about Sixpence services each spring.

For families in home visiting programs, the Keys to Interactive Parenting Scale (KIPS) determines parenting strengths based on a 7-10 minute video of the caregiver playing with his or her child aged 4 months to 6 years.

#### **Child Development**

There are several tools used to survey child development in the area of language, socialemotional strengths, physical coordination, math, literacy, and thinking skills. The information is collected annually in the spring which shows the child's growth over time.

Devereux Early Childhood Assessment (DECA): This parent-completed survey considers how the child interacts with others and expresses feelings.

Early Communication Indicator (ECI): This tool measures children's growth in the ability to express themselves through gestures, vocalizations, words, and sentences.

Results Matter Assessment: The home visitor or teacher completes the survey of developmental skills.

### Child health and well-being

In the spring, the home visitor or classroom teacher interviews the family about health and safety practices.
